Visiting the Holy Sites

When we speak of Jerusalem we are reminded of the words of Bishop Cragg which says. "Our first task in approaching another people, another religion, and another culture is to remove our sandals, for we are stepping on the sacred grounds, lest we trample on people's dream, or worse, we may forget that God has been there before our arrival".

Living in a new country is quite challenging for the fact that we are simply different. However those differences lead us to a deeper respect for each culture and religion.

It was such a good experience seeing the historical places where our Jesus Christ was born, grew up and died. We were filled with so much joy and blessing for having an opportunity to be here.

Our experience in Ecce Home was a great blessing to all of us. Each Sister expresses her concern; kindness and love that make us feel at home.

First we visited the Western Wall where we have witnessed their deep faith in God. We joined the group of women who were dancing and singing. We were dancing with our soul glorifying and thanking God for all the blessings that we have received.

In the next day the cold windy morning welcomed us as we walked to the Mount of Olives, where Jesus and his 12 disciples had walked and prayed for Jerusalem. We can imagine that in our 2 years of living in Jerusalem, we will experience mountainous

challenges but like Jesus and his disciples we will walk hand in hand to sustain and



have courage in continuing the journey and moving forward towards our goal.

The following day

we visited Bethlehem which is the beginning of our salvation; we remember the Holy Family of Jesus and the gift of his Incarnation. We expressed our heartfelt gratitude to Jesus for being simple and having a humble heart.

The silent atmosphere inside the Holy Sepulchre helped us to go back in His time especially the day of His trial. This is the place where full of tears, we remembered and contemplated the sufferings of Jesus. We simply sat in the corner, praying and listening to His voice in silence. Our Eucharistic celebration inside the Holy Sepulchre strengthened our faith in God. We felt the presence of Christ during the celebration of the liturgy; his words remind us always to follow him and to remain faithful.

On the other hand we have noticed that since Jesus' time up to the present, people have cried out for socio-eco-political justice. People have always struggled to obtain their daily human needs, their desire for peace, justice and fullness of life on all dimensions.

God is calling us to be more sensitive to the needs of our brethren and of all God's creation; to reach out to them in an act of loving service. Through this reality, we are challenged to be stewards of God's love for humanity.

Finally living in this Holy Land, we remember the words of Father Theodore Ratisbone saying: "I have no need to see the Holy Places. All I need to do is to contemplate from my window, the ruins of Mount Sion and the Mount of Olives".

The Pilgrimage

Our experiences of visiting various holy sites such as the Mt. of Olives, Bethlehem, the Holy Sepulcher, the Via Dolorosa, the Western Wall and attending the Arabic mass at St. Saviour were very meaningful. It was a moment that gives a new meaning to our faith. It was a grace filled experience to be in the place that is so significant to our faith tradition. We were able to see, feel, touch and smell what before was a mere words that we usually read and hear in the bible. Now we are becoming part of what makes the land of Jesus holy. We enjoyed each moment: praying on the Mount of Olives just like what Jesus and his disciples did 2000 years ago. We shared some jokes and laughs along the way and stopping and resting for a while every now and then. These experiences also enabled us to appreciate the beauty of the three religions trying to live together peacefully. It was a joy to see how the Jewish, Muslims and Christians worship one God.

On our way on the "Via Dolorosa" we were questioning ourselves, for example: What kind of cross do we carry? How can we carry the cross by ourself? Can we ask others for help? Can we help others

to carry their cross? Also when we fall down, are we able to continue our life journey like Jesus? We also prayed for the people suffering in our own country especially women and children who are exploited and abused.

We had a very rich experience in four days and it can be summarized by praying for peace for the whole world, that the wall of indifference would fall down: for example when we are at the place where Jesus told his dicplies "Peace" for the first time after his Resurrection; also when he was weeping and praying for peace for Jerusalem. And it is also connected to the first Hebrew word we learned, "SHALOM" שלם which means peace. We also prayed with the sister for peace.

Finally what made our pilgrimage meaningful and joyful was that all of us were walking together in the land of Jesus.

In conclusion what made our pilgrimageworthwhile was food during lunch, like eating falafel together. This food is very famous for the Palestinian and Israeli people.
